2022 ANNUAL AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT


All of Hope's financial records were found to be in order by the Audit Committee members consisting of Lana Albright, Skip Lister, and Val Schneider.



PR. CHRISTIE'S CORNER

Seeing Jesus

Jesus said to [Mary Magdalene], "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" - John 20:15 NRSV



tomb "early on the first day of the week" (v. 1), to discover that the stone on the tomb has been rolled away, and Jesus's body is missing. Mary runs to find Peter and another disciple, and those two come with her to verify that in fact the tomb is empty! But then the two of them return to their homes, and Mary remains outside of the tomb, weeping. She is approached by someone whom she assumes to be the gardener, who asks her why she is weeping. It isn't until the "gardener" says her name that she realizes - this is no gardener; it's Jesus.

This isn't the only time in the Gospels when the resurrected Jesus appears and people do not recognize him. Later in John 20, the disciple Thomas does not recognize Jesus, until after Thomas has placed his hands in Jesus's wounds. In the next chapter, Jesus appears to Peter and some of the other disciples. Jesus is on the beach and the disciples are in a boat, fishing. The mysterious man on the shore tells them to put their nets in the water, and the fishermen recognize Jesus after they pull in so many fish the nets begin to break. In Luke 24, Jesus appears to two disciples on the road to Emmaus, and again, they do not recognize him.

It always amazes me how Jesus's closest friends would not have recognized him. Certainly the



disciples would not have been expecting to see him alive, after being present at his crucifixion. But they knew him so well that it seems they would recognize him even if they weren't expecting him. Maybe

his appearance changed when he was resurrected. Or perhaps his friends were so entrenched in their grief that they failed to see him right in front of them.

When do we fail to see Jesus? Is it at times of grief, heartbreak, or struggle? Perhaps we get so focused on our problems that we fail to Jesus right there in front of us, guiding through the most difficult times of our lives. Perhaps also, we get so wrapped up in what is going on in our lives that we fail to see Jesus in other people. We fail to see the Jesus who has promised us that when we help someone in need, we are helping Jesus (Matthew 25).

Another term for "Easter Sunday" is "Resurrection Sunday." Each year that we celebrate Easter, we are celebrating the Resurrection. We are celebrating Jesus's aliveness! We are Kentruction (also celebrating our own lives, the SUNDAY times when death has been all around

us and yet we experience Resurrection. And we are celebrating the life of our faith community, Hope Lutheran Church.

As we continue through this Easter season, let's look for Jesus. Let's make it a point to find the Risen Christ alive in every moment of every day, and in everything we do. Let's live in the eternal HOPE of the Resurrection. **Pastor Christie**

HOW JESUS SAYS YOUR NAME

It's been said that when someone loves you, they say your name differently. Your name is "safe" coming from their mouth.

Mary Magdalene found this to be true. Walking alone in the dark to Jesus' tomb, she wanted nothing less than for a concerned loved one to interrupt her private grief, crooning her name in pity: "Oh, Mary, there, there." Or worse, someone from her old life



who would spit her name like a curse, knowing that Jesus had cast out her demons. But then Mary saw the tomb open and panicked, ran to get Simon, hurried back to the garden.

Angels addressed her — not by name, just "Woman ..." — and then a gardener: "Woman ..."

Except then — "Mary" — this man knew her after all, speaking her name so knowingly, tenderly, lovingly that she recognized him. "Mary." Her name was safe in his mouth, her life safe in his care. He wasn't the gardener. He was her teacher, her friend, her Savior.

Friend, your name also is safe in Jesus' mouth, your life safe in his care, for he loves you deeply.

THE GOD WHO HIDES

Isaiah declares, "Truly, you are a God who hides himself, O God of Israel, the Savior" (45:15, ESV). But why would God hide? Isn't our knowing God the point? Martin Luther explained that God hides in



unexpected places so as not to be found where the world assumes a god would be — in power, status, fame, wealth — but to be found in weakness, humility and places of suffering.

"Those who have found God in the cross of Jesus Christ," said 20th-century theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, "know how wonderfully God hides himself in this world and how he is closest precisely when we believe him to be most distant." So God assures us of his presence in the humble manger, among the poor and outcast during his ministry, in the excruciating suffering of the cross, and with us in every struggle.

God hides not to avoid us but so we will discover him precisely where we need him most, and where others need us most.




Use batik, a unique fabric-dying method, to create flags celebrating the good news of Christ's resurrection.



- · Colored chalk
- White linen fabric
- Washable gel glue
- Acrylic craft paint
- Textile medium
- Paintbrushes

What you do:

- 1. Cut fabric to the desired size and shape. Set it on a flat, protected surface. With chalk, lightly sketch an Easter design or message.
- 2. Completely cover the chalk lines with gel glue. Let dry.
- 3. Mix equal parts paint and textile medium. Paint the flag with that mixture, which makes paint permanent. Let dry.
- 4. Soak the dried fabric in warm water a few minutes. Then gently peel away the glue to reveal the unpainted areas. Lay flat to dry.
- 5. Hang the flags and celebrate!
