DISMISSAL

In the year 1820, there was a 6-week-old Puritan girl, who was suffering from an eye infection.



Her parents went to obtain the services of the town physician but found the physician had gone out of town. They decided to utilize services from another local physician. The "doctor" treated the baby by putting a mustard poultice on her eyes. The treatment was successful and cleared up the eye infection, however, the poultice burned the fragile little baby's corneas causing her to be blind for the rest of her life. No one knew at that time, that the precious little blind baby would go down in history as the world's most famous hymn songwriter of all time. This little baby's name was Fanny J. Crosby.

Frances Jane van Alstyne (aka Fanny J. Crosby) was born on March 24, 1820 in Brewster, New York. During her childhood, her biggest desire and daily prayers were to be able to go to school and learn just like children who could see. Despite her losing her eyesight, Fanny had the faith of a mustard seed. She stated at one point in her life, "It seemed intended by the blessed providence of God that I should be blind all my life, and I thank him for the dispensation." In 1835, God answered Fanny's prayer! She was enrolled into the New York Institution for the Blind. During her tenure at NYIB and music career, she met with over 22 presidents and famous dignitaries, and submitted a poetic eulogy to the New York Times, remembering President William Henry Harrison. She collaborated with other music composers, like Ira Sankey (who was in ministry with the famous reverend Dwight L. Moody), Phoebe Palmer Knapp, and William Doane, in creating some of the world's most notable hymns today. On Sunday, March 26, 1905, churches from different denominations around the world declared March 26th as Fanny Crosby Day. Fanny died from a cerebral hemorrhage on

February 12, 1915, at the age of 94. Her biggest desire in life was to see Jesus and witnesses say that when she took her last breath, she had a smile on her face and was at peace.

Fanny always looked to God first when writing a song. She stated "It may seem a little old-fashioned, always to begin one's work with prayer, but I never undertake a hymn without first asking the good Lord for inspiration." Fanny wrote over 10,000 hymns and had over 200 pen names. Some of her famous works include, "Blessed Assurance", "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross", "He Hideth My Soul", "To God Be The Glory" and many more. In today's service, we will be singing "Blessed Assurance" and "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross". The following is a little back story to each song.

"Blessed Assurance" written in 1873 is by far the most famous song Fanny wrote. Her best friend, Phoebe Knapp was having a large pipe organ installed in her home. Fanny was visiting during the time the organ was being installed. While waiting for the organ installation to be complete, Phoebe asked Fanny if she would listen to a melody on the piano she had just composed. After listening to just a few notes, Phoebe asked Fanny what she thought the tune said. Crosby replied, "Blessed Assurance, Jesus is mine." Less than 30 minutes later, Fanny had written the words to "Blessed Assurance". "Blessed Assurance" is one of the most famous and translated hymns in history besides the famous song "Amazing Grace". Fanny's vision of these words came from the Apostle Paul in Philippians 1:21, "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain" (ESV)

"Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross" written in 1869 is another well-known hymn. The song is based from Galatians 6:14, "But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me and I unto the world." (ESV). The melody was composed by Howard Doane before Fanny wrote the lyrics. The song has been translated into several languages and is still being sung in churches and memorial services today.
